

For 78 years, generations of motorcyclists have been coming to Sturgis to have some fun with fellow enthusiasts. I recall those earlier days as a youngster around my dad's Indian dealership on Junction Avenue – now the site of Coe Meyer's Gypsie Vintage Cycle. My folks were instrumental in starting the Rally in 1938 and it has been held every year since, except 2 years during WWII.

Those early Rallies consisted of visitors, locals, and competitors that totaled a few hundred and most lived within 100-200 miles. It has grown! In 2015, the official count was just under 1,000,000 for the 10 days of the Rally as advertised... but SD State had traffic counters in place that showed traffic was up 80% the four days prior to the "official

start" as many arrived early because "The 75th" was such a significant event. That put it over 1,000,000! Cyclists are now coming from every state, every province of Canada and over 35 nations of the world. It is the largest cycle rally in the world.

Statistics show the majority have been here before and every year are joined by those who just got the message. The message is that "for 10-12 days every August... Sturgis hosts something that interests every cyclist".

Over 1.000 vendors display everything from accessories, foodstuffs, tattoos

to fancy painting. It has gotten to the point that if you aren't seen in Sturgis, you aren't seriously in the business. And look at the multimillion dollar businesses that have chosen the Sturgis Rally as the time/place to serve, supply and entertain. Relatively new additions include Shade Valley Resort, One-

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5 Points for Experiencing the Black Hills Rally in Sturgis

Don't take that "trailer shame" – trailer

Sturgis, South Dakota is the epicenter of the Black Hills Motorcycle Rally and it is almost smack dab in the center of the country. It's 1,300 miles from Sacramento, 1,000 miles North of Dallas and over 1,400 miles from Pittsburgh, so experiencing Sturgis on your own bike can be a challenge.


That distance always brings up the question of whether to trailer your bikes to Sturgis or a nearby location *or* ride the entire way here. It is a badge of honor for some to have ridden the entire distance, no matter where they live – and if you don't you are somehow looked down upon. There are even t-shirts and patches that try to shame riders for not having ridden their bikes from their home towns.

While Sturgis and the surrounding Black Hills National Forest are some of the most beautiful areas to ride, the geography before you get here can be some of the worst.

Riding your bike for days, across uneventful territory, limiting the time you have to spend at the actual Rally, doesn't make a lot of sense, if you really want to experience all the beauty of the Rally area and have more days to spend in Sturgis. Go ahead, let them make their "\$30k and 30 miles" jokes, and you enjoy the Rally, your way.



Simply put, if you are into the rowdy, wild and crazy night life that the Rally has to offer, stay near those activities. No one wants to cut the fun short, because you have a long, dark ride back to your accommodations. Riding under the influence is never cool or smart, and the police force is beefed up during the Rally with an eye for drunken riders and traffic violations.

On the flipside, if you go to the Rally for the riding and don't plan to spend much time carousing the bars, strip clubs and all the shenanigans of that scene, stay outside of those areas. Costs of accommodations are generally less expensive and you will have easy access to getting on the road.



Last year the estimated attendance at the Rally was just under 500,000 people, and each year it grows in popularity, so you can imagine that getting a hotel or camp site can be difficult and pricey.

The further ahead you plan and reserve your spots the better – better availability and better pricing. Check the cancellation policy details to ensure you have time to cancel if needed. They typically are weeks ahead of the event, not the 24-48 hours of traditional hotels, keep that in mind. Even if you are toying with the idea of ever coming to Sturgis, book your accommodations early.



Rally events – not just a side show, they are the show

While most people equate Sturgis with wild partying and/or epic scenic riding, there is much more to experience during the event. The Rally offers riders a variety of things to do and see, all of which add to your life event that is "Sturgis". From the Rally Races, the event that started the entire Rally, to the Sturgis Museum that celebrates the riders and bikes of yesteryear and today, both are definitely worth checking out. Tuesday Tattoo competition and Mustache/Beard contests add to the event and it's great people watching too

Also check out the events in the local towns. I recommend you get an early start to Hulett, Wyoming for "Ham & Jam Wednesday". (Plus, Hulett is on the road to Devil's Tower, so you can knock two things off your bucket list.) The traffic jam of bikes headed into Hulett by mid-day can be backed up for miles and miles.

Take time to take it all in

During the 10 days of the Rally, it is the busiest time of the year, with as many people in the area as live in Seattle city limits. So take time to get places. Use caution and don't be in a hurry. There will be lines everywhere - for food, for gas, for bars, and for making a turn. Enjoy the experience for what it is. A celebration of bikes, bikers and the people who like both.

Do spend some time walking up and down Main Street. Check out the countless number of amazing bikes and talk to the other riders. Bikers may play up a bad-ass image, but in the end we all are here for our love of biking. Enjoy.

How to Rally in Sturgis for your first time (It will not be your last)

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Whenever I tell people I have been to Sturgis, meaning the Black Hills Motor Classic that happens every August, the typical response is one of longing to be able to do the same. "Oh man, I have always wanted to go to Sturgis!" or "I have to do that one year, it's on my bucket list."

To all you that want to just

pack up and head to Sturgis, to the biggest, baddest biker event in all the world, I say go. Make it happen. It's not as hard as you think, and I am here to tell you how you can easily do the Sturgis Rally for your first time.

People pile up a bunch of excuses when it comes to backing out actually going to a remote town in Western South Dakota, a

spot on the map that is literally thousands of miles from any coast, East, West or South. Two things discourage most folks from coming to Sturgis. Distance is one of them. The other is the bike. They either don't have one or don't want to ride their bike for days just to get to the Rally.

First off, if you don't have a bike, but you know how to ride and are not currently enjoying life riding a bike most of the year where you live – I say to you -GET ONE!

You can do Sturgis on any brand of bike. Hell you can do Sturgis on any 'kind' of bike. Even the odd looking, but smooth riding, backward trikes are welcome and granted all the respect of any biker here.

You have a couple of options when it comes to having a bike at Sturgis. Rent or Take Your Own. Local rental operators are geared up for the two weeks of Rally season and if you book in advance, you will have no problem getting a rental bike. No

shame there. These bikes are typically the newest models and afford you all the ease of arriving in the area, via plane or car, and having a bike for your time at the Black Hills Rally.

Renting a bike at the Rally will take care of much of the distance issues, unless you want to ride YOUR bike at the Rally. You can either ride the entire way there, or pull them on a trailer until you get into the area. I

suggest trailering. Your reason for wanting to go to Sturgis is to enjoy all that the Rally has to offer, from its scenic byways, monuments and of course the nightlife. To maximize your time at the Rally, trailer your bikes, and don't take any of the "trailering shame" some will try to dish out. Being a biker is all about individuality. Buck up and do things your way, and be good with it.

Once you get here with a bike, you will need a place to stay. Booking in advance, and I mean months in advance

is best, but once here, the Rally's riding area covers over 1,000 square miles.

Bikers cover the routes between Devils Tower to Custer State Park to Rapid City and then back to Sturgis. The City of Sturgis of course is the epicenter of the Rally, but since it is a riding event, I suggest that you can stay in any area within the territory, especially if riding is your main focus and night life downtown Sturgis is not. There are many small rooms for rent and campgrounds just on the outskirts of the area, much more of an economical choice. My first time we stayed in a campground right on the Wyoming/South Dakota border. I felt like we might be missing out of the downtown Sturgis action, but we were there for riding, and ride we did. Being further out afforded us great sunrise rides in open country and less congested roads book-ended with gorgeous sunset rides to our quieter and calmer campground. Look for accommodations a little further out of the epicenter for more affordability and convenience.

For your first time, plan your days to maximize your riding. You certainly want to see Devils Tower and spend time on the Needles Highway near Mount Rushmore. Of course you will want to visit downtown Sturgis and plan to spend some time to enjoy all the bikes and memorabilia shopping.

Keep in mind that you need to have a way to lock up your bike, helmet and other gear. Plan a locking and secure system with your bike, or simply take a back pack to carry your gear with





you as you stroll the streets with its thousands of different bikes and people that no doubt will be the basis for your tales to your office friends back home. Getting on the road early in the day is better. If you think 500,000 people, most on bikes, do not create traffic jams on open roads, you are gravely mistaken.

P.S. One last tip for *vour first time.* DO NOT WAVE TO EVERY BIKE THAT PASSES YOU. They don't do that in Sturgis. They are happy to see you and have a special bond with you, but to do that for every biker on the road that is a bit too much. You will catch yourself waving at first, because that is what we do, bikers acknowledging the brotherhood of bikers. But don't. Just don't.

Be smart, be safe. Use your riding signals for your safety. Patience in riding is helpful. Most of the roads are clear of cars, so it literally is a motorcycle mecca. Enjoy.

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the Bricks

In the heart of downtown Sturgis, the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum and Hall of Fame is known to riders all-year-round. But a little known fact is, that it is also visited by many tourists that don't ride, but are curious about the machines, lifestyle, Hall of Fame and Rally.

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In 2001, with community support, some of the original Board members of the Sturgis National Museum (1990-1995), decided to renew the effort and put together the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum. The organization was developed as a 501(c)3, non-profit educational charity, owned and operated by a volunteer, self-perpetuating Board of Directors.

For the first year it was housed in the historic Pyramid building on West Main Street. In 2002, the City of Sturgis donated the use of the decommissioned post office on the corner of Main Street & Junction. This immediately gave the Museum room to grow and a direct connection to the Rally. The Sturgis Motorcycle Museum continued to grow its collection, events, following and vision and so set its sights on expanding the building and in 2007, launched a Capital Campaign. The campaign had three major directives:

- **1.** Expand the square footage of the building
- **2.** Develop an Endowment Fund to support operations
- **3.** Cultivate a Collections and Exhibits Fund

Early donations from the Buffalo Chip, John Paul DeJoria's Peace, Love & Happiness organization, Indian Motorcycles and others helped the fund get off to a great start, and these companies and organizations continue their generous support today.

The City of Sturgis recognized the importance of the Museum and to assist in the Capital Campaign, the City Council passed a resolution stating that upon ground breaking for an expansion, the City would donate the deed for the building and property to the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame.

The Museum purchased the property adjacent to the Museum, to allow for the expansion and to have more room for events like the Biker Block Party, every Rally. In addition to more property and a growing collection, new windows were installed, a new roof completed and in 2017, permits were filed to begin construction. Major demolition began on December 2, 2017 and the project completion is set for the Rally of 2018.

There are many museums that have one person or organization that supports it and its mission. The Sturgis Motorcycle Museum and Hall of Fame is built by riders, sponsors and the work of the Board of Directors and staff. It is a unique place to visit and an important place to be a part of. 
until then to be a part of this exciting project! There will be events on the property from 2018 and leading up to the Grand Opening!

We asked Scott what he thought made this piece so successful.



I believe this piece brings people back to a simpler time in their life."






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EVENING EVENTS fill the Harley-Davidson Rally Point Stage in Sturgis during the 78th



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

Why Sturgis?

From the archives of the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame. Photos from the Pearl Hoel Collection.

One of the most frequently asked questions by visitors to Sturgis is "Why Sturgis?" And what started the Rally in this little town? Believe it or not, the refrigerator plays a role in the annual Rally being in Sturgis.

J.C. "Pappy" Hoel was born and raised in Sturgis, SD. His family owned an ice business and provided ice for ice boxes in the Sturgis and Ft. Meade area. Ice was cut from dams in Vanocker Canyon and then was stored in icehouses until it was ready to be used. Pappy took over the business and did well until the refrigerator became a common household item. The days of the iceman were over.

Hoel had a love of motorcycles and had a number of "basket cases" in the past. He needed a new business and decided to write to the Indian Motorcycle Company and requested to become the local dealer in Sturgis. In 1936 he opened Hoel's Motors on Junction Avenue. Indian required dealers to have at least

one motorcycle the people could test ride, so Hoel convinced a friend to purchase one and have it available to the dealership. That was the start of his business and the rest is history.

It was then the 30s and money was not readily available

for major purchases. Pappy's shop was open but sales were slow, however people would stop in, mostly to visit. Hoel and his customers and other riders decided they should start a riding club. The group had been riding and hosting local races and on January 21, 1938 the first official meeting of the club was held. Hoel and six friends and fellow riders attended. The minutes from that first meeting indicate that Hoel was the temporary President (we can only assume

Pappy was always available to help any motorcyclist who came to town. he did not want the office) and a president and other officers were then elected. The club was named the Jackpine Gypsies at that first meeting. Other suggestions were "Bearcats" and Hoel's choice was "Coyotes". The Jackpine

Gypsies started to plan an AMA sanctioned race for August of 1938. Hoel was involved in the planning of that first race. The prize money for the races was \$750, and drew 9 racers and about 200 spectators.





Pappy and his wife, Pearl set up a large tent in their backyard that year and anyone who needed a place to stay was welcome. Pearl furnished sandwiches, doughnuts, coffee and lemonade to the approximately 200 people who attended in 1938.

As the Rally grew, Pappy and Pearl continued to be active in the annual races and the Rally. Pappy encouraged local businessmen to plan events around the Rally. The businessmen were excited to have the visitors frequent their locales. Entertainment was planned and Pappy spent countless hours announcing happenings on Main Street. He even rode through flaming walls of wood to entertain the crowds at the races.

In the early years of the Rally, when the attendance outgrew the Hoel's backyard, a big free feed was held for everyone in the Sturgis Park followed by a program involving the riders. Several contests were held as a part of this with Pearl doing much of the planning. As funds were limited in those days one of Pearl's contributions was creating a crown for the Queen. She did this by stringing pearls and pretty beads on a wire (to hold the shape) following a design she drew out on cardboard first. Several lucky ladies were recipients of these crowns. Some other categories were honored also. Some of these were best dressed male rider, female rider, best dressed club and longest distance rider.

Pappy preferred hill climbs, trials and even trick riding to dirt track racing for himself. This did not stop him from sponsoring other racers throughout the years and spending lots of time at various tracks around the country.


Pappy was always available to help any motorcyclist who came to town. Talk to some of the "oldtimers" and you will hear some amazing stories of his kindness to everybody. He opened his shop and welcomed them to come in and work on their bikes. Many stories have been told how he didn't charge the bikers, he did it as an act of kindness.

Pearl Hoel and some of the other wives of the Jackpine Gypsies club members prepared food and refreshments and sometimes even provided jackets and extra blankets. They agreed to meet the riders on the Gypsy Tours, which were now a regular part of the annual Rally, at Devils Tower or Custer providing a lunch of beef, beans, potato salad and watermelon. They charged $65 \, c$ per person for the meal.

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Indian Motorcycle Company folded in 1953. Pappy was franchised to sell the Royal Enfield Indians that were built in England, but

problems with distribution meant that this endeavor didn't last too long.

He then became a Yamaha dealer. He continued to sell Yamahas until his retirement in 1970.

Pappy continued to be a part of the Sturgis® Motorcycle RallyTM and to promote the event right up until his death at 84 in 1989. Pearl passed away in 2005 at the age of 99. She had a gift of recall and her

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ability to share oral history was in constant demand. She enjoyed every opportunity she had to share her memories of the Rally and the

> friendships she had developed over the years.

Pappy wrote a book, "Life's Bits & Pieces." In his book he admits that his recognition for promoting the Rally meant a lot to him. He said, "Among my many

trophies I am most proud of the plaques presented to me by Black Hills and Badlands Association, the City of Sturgis, the Sturgis Chamber of Commerce, and the Black Hills Motor Classic for various activities they felt promoted better motorcycling and benefits to the Black Hills and my hometown of Sturgis."

Times have changed the Rally from the small gathering of motorcyclists who were like a family and stayed in the Hoel's backyard or the City Park. Now Sturgis sees from 500,000 to 740,000 or more motorcyclists each year. Accommodations are now huge campgrounds, hotels and motels, and homes in Sturgis. We are still a small town of nearly 6,700 people and we are proud of our hospitality. Even though Pappy and Pearl are no longer here, we are proud of the fact that those of us who live here still want you to feel like you are coming "home" whenever you arrive in Sturgis.

So the answer to the question "Why Sturgis?" can be summed up in one word – refrigeration.



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

Freedom Fighter Award

Special Honors **EXPLAINED**

The Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame Board has *four special honors* that can be awarded during the Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony. These honorees, their stories and contributions are acknowledged and celebrated within the Hall of Fame.

FOUNDERS AWARD

This special designation is reserved for individuals who have played a special role in the founding, maintaining and/or promoting of the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame.

FREEDOM FIGHTER AWARD

The Freedom Fighter Award recognizes the sacrifices individuals across the nation, and world, have made to protect the rights of motorcyclists through their efforts in the political arena and in grass roots motorcyclists rights organizations.

J C "PAPPY" HOEL OUT-STANDING ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This award is reserved for individuals who have played a special role in the founding, maintaining and/or promoting the Sturgis® Motorcycle RallyTM.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The Lifetime Achievement Award honors those who have greatly contributed to the world of motorcycling and have been recognized by many of the leading motorcycle related organizations, their peers and the general riding community.

**The Hall of Fame awards are not designated every year.

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JEFF DECKER

Sculptor and historian Jeff Decker is known for immortalizing motorcycling in bronze. Perhaps the most notable of his sculptures is "By The Horns" (also known as The Hill Climber) — a 16-foot-tall,



5,000-pound bronze located on the grounds of the Harley-Davidson Museum. (See a miniature replica of the sculpture at the Sturgis Area Chamber of Commerce.) His bronze-cast master works depict the synergy of man and machine, particularly historic motorcycles, making him equally well known in both the motorcycling community and the world of fine art. Working full-time at a bronze casting foundry, Decker's first idea was to capture Man's quest for speed in all vehicles. His works exemplify the spirit and passion of motorcycling and they belong in a museum dedicated to these endeavors.

JACK HOEL

Hometown resident, and son of Pappy and Pearl Hoel, Jack Hoel has been a major influence in the development of the Rally, while also having a distinguished career in the world of motorcycling. From his racing



days — including a series of state titles starting in the 1950s and running up to a 250cc class win at the legendary Daytona 200 in 1964 —Hoel parlayed his hot hand on the track to a gig as manager of the Yamaha Race Team in the 1970s. While working as Yamaha's Head of New Product Development, Hoel and his team later created the iconic DT-1 (Enduro) — arguably the most important dual-purpose bike in history — and he was also instrumental in the development of Yamaha's XS 650. The XS 650 was the first big bore, four-stroke powerplant produced by Yamaha and it continued to shake up the motorcycle racing world for decades. Today, Jack Hoel is passionate about the Rally, its roots in racing and remains a prominent member of the Sturgis community.

ARMONDO "MONDO" PORRAS

Mondo Porras has been defining the "look" of motorcycles since 1967. Together with custom builder and founder of Denver's Choppers, Mondo created some of the first aftermarket parts for the burgeoning chopper industry. Denver's Choppers globally influ-



ential extended springer front ends and custom frames were influential in establishing the "long-bike" phenomenon that is synonymous with "choppers" and still popular around the world. This distinctive look has earned Mondo many awards in the custom bike world. For more than 50 years, Mondo Porras has been building custom motorcycles and promoting the sport. Through television, books, magazines and producing vintage chopper shows, his influence continues to this day and his peers have even deemed him the "Godfather of Choppers."

MARILYN STEMP

Together with late husband Dennis, Marilyn Stemp started IronWorks Magazine in 1989. The publication combined his artistic creativity and passion for motorcycles with her experience as a journalist, organizational skills and attraction to mechan-



ical pursuits. Utilizing their experience in the printing industry and graphic arts they wanted to ensure Iron-Works would not only read well, but presented motorcycling in a positive manner. Following the last issue of IronWorks in March of 2014, Marilyn launched a new title, Iron Trader News. In the past four years, Iron Trader News' collaborative and inclusive presentation has become a trusted source that entertains and informs on a framework of fairness and integrity. Marilyn continues the work that she and Dennis began, striving "to elevate and expand well beyond the magazine's pages and digital reach, bringing partners and readers along for the ride." She also works for other notable motorcycle related businesses, events and charitable organizations, including the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame, Bikernet and The Buffalo Chip.



VALERIE THOMPSON

"America's Queen of Speed," Valerie Thompson holds 7 land speed records! She has exceeded speeds in excess of 300 mph on two wheels at the Bonneville Salt Flats. Her drag racing career spans a decade



driven by a desire to go faster and break even more records. Off the racetrack, Valerie works as a vehicle presenter at Barrett-Jackson Auction Company and Metro Auto Auctions in Arizona. Between her work, racing commitments and many special appearances each year, Valerie donates time supporting charitable organizations and inspiring children overcoming personal challenges. Because of this work and her racing accomplishments, she was awarded the "American Women Riders Community Hero Award" in 2011.

HAMSTERS USA

Hamsters is a world wide organization of Custom Motorcycle enthusiasts founded in Daytona Beach in 1978. Founding members are Steve Allington,



Barry Cooney, Ed Kerr, Jimmy Leahy, Arlen Ness, Dave Perewitz, Susie Perewitz and Donnie Smith. Members make the annual trek each year to the Sturgis® Motorcycle Rally[™] for their annual gathering for custom bikes, fun and to give generously to local Black Hills charitable organizations. Although many individual members have been inducted into the Sturgis Hall of Fame, the entire group is being inducted into Sturgis Hall of Fame this year for the philanthropic deeds that the Hamsters USA have collectively donated to the Black Hills community over the years.

Ray was the first drag racer to be sponsored by Harley-Davidson.



Founder of Samson Exhaust, Kenny is the inventor and leading innovator of numerous patented high-performance exhaust He started to accumulate quite systems. a collection of old, unique and obscure motorcycles which he shared with the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum when it opened and became one of the largest contributors to the museum.

After earning a college degree in Mechanical Engineering and Industrial Design, he went to work for Independent Cycle, Inc. in Rapid City, SD. He designed a softail chassis that started a craze for the long and low style. It became known world-wide as the Lowlife Chassis. Not long after, the Hardlife was born. Named Frame Designer of the Year in 2006 at the V-Twin Excellence Awards in Cincinnati. Opened Prugh Design in 2006 and continued to build custom motorcycles. Has been on Biker Build-Off and helped students build charity motorcycles.



Making History Across America

While the Sturgis Motorcycle Museum is busy preserving the history of motorcycling and commemorating the colorful characters of the past that have managed to stand out above the fray, the Motorcycle Cannonball is busy making modern day motorcycling history. Since the first run in 2010, the most difficult motorcycle endurance run in the world has become an American institution and has invited the world to share in the glory of celebrating what has become its own traveling museum. The biennial coast-to-coast

Cannonball run encourages every motorcycle marque ever made to take to the field to prove its might

as its owners challenge themselves to live a life less common. For the 2018 run, 110 riders are scheduled to show the world the abilities of their personal machines as they undertake a northern route that will cover more than 3,600 miles in 16 days. Several of the machines registered are more than

100-years old.

Riders and collectors from around the world will take the green flag in the coastal town of Portland, Maine on September 8, 2018 and race against the onset of autumn weather across 15 states while struggling to keep their antique motorcycles on the road. The route will include mountain passes

The biennial coast-to-coast Cannonball run encourages every motorcycle marque ever made to take to the field... and narrow two lane back roads, utilizing a total of less than 10 miles of Interstates. And while the Cannonball has come to be known as the world's most difficult antique motorcycle run, it is also the most gratifying. Past riders report experiencing a spiritual awakening as

they tour the breadth of our great nation, using their machines for

the purposes they were originally intended for. It's a rare occurrence to be puttering along at 35 mph, visiting Americana one tiny town at a time and slowly letting go of life as we know it to become part of a traveling herd of antiquated machines. The challenge of keeping an antique running is a daily chore but the process of becoming a family that supports one another through the miles is something that will change a life forever. Racers pull together to support each other in the "man against the miles" battle of skill, grit and luck. Trading parts, sharing tips, helping and encouraging fellow riders through the joys, angst and miseries is not just the challenge, but also the daily reality during the run. Sunburned, tired and wrung out riders greet the sunrise ready to roll and by evening entire engines are being rebuilt in parking lot workshops so they can do it all over again for the next 300 miles. The grind can be maddening, but the exhilaration of succeeding at life on the road sustains each competitor and sees them through to ride another day.

The route includes incredible scenery and notable landmarks as part of the adventure. Each of the prior Motorcycle Cannonball runs have included visits to mo-








torcycle museums and this year is no exception. Early on, the group will visit Hemmings Motor News in Bennington, Vermont and the National Motorcycle Museum in Anamosa, Iowa later during Stage 6 of the route. During the group's only day of rest scheduled in Sturgis, South Dakota, they will also be welcomed at the famous Sturgis Motorcycle Museum. Jason Sims, owner of the Motorcycle Cannonball, is a Sturgis resident so it makes perfect sense that the group's day of rest would be on his home turf where hill climbs and 78 years of motorcycle rallies have forever secured a place in motorcycling history for Sturgis.

The second half of the transcontinental trek involves traversing some intense mountain peaks and will include Glacier National Park before the group arrives in the quirky city of Portland, Oregon. By the time riders see the checkered flag, lasting friendships will have formed and lives will never be the same for many of the warriors. To witness the glory of these great United States from the back of a machine built before our grandfathers were born is as inspiring as it gets. For those who are lucky enough to experience the Motorcycle Cannonball first hand, it is indeed an historical and monumental journey. For everyone else, there's a

rare opportunity to watch the time capsules come through your town so go to the website and mark your calendars. The Cannonballers are coming. www.motorcyclecannonball.com

The Love of Sturgis RUNS DEEP in 2018 Sturgis Grand Marshal Roland Sands

When searching for the 2018 Sturgis Grand Marshal, the fact that Roland Sands has been coming to the Sturgis Rally since he was 15 made him a pretty strong candidate.

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"I was too young to ride but I rode anyway. I rode a vintage motorcycle around, a little 650. That was before my dad came to Sturgis as a company, back in the day with PM. We went for a couple of years without doing any type of business, so we came out to ride motorcycles and hang out and enjoy the party. I've been coming a long time."

Not only has Sands been coming to Sturgis a long time, you might

say that motorcycles are in his DNA. The PM he mentions is Performance Machine, the company his father Perry Sands founded that's known for making some of the best motorcycle wheels and braking systems in the industry. Sands literally grew up in the shop and Perry kept his son busy

doing any task he could find because as the saying goes "idle hands are the devil's workshop" and admittedly his parents didn't want to leave mischievous young Roland alone for too long. As a result, he learned how to use tools of the trade like a disc grinder and drill press at an early age. Working at his father's shop would lay several foundations, from working with shop tools to learning the intricacies of high performance motorcycle parts to a work ethic he'd carry into his adult life.

Sands also started riding at an

early age. His father got him his first motorcycle, a RM 50 dirt bike, on his fifth birthday. Even though he biffed and broke a bone within minutes of getting his first bike, Sands was hooked. Hard and fast was the only way he knew how to ride. Growing up in Southern California, an area with a rich history of desert and dirt racing, Sands lived to ride his dirt bike. He was a speed demon on the streets as well and began his motorcycle road racing career in 1993. Victories and track records soon followed, highlighted by the 1998 AMA 250 GP Championship. After a successful 10-year career, he decid-

ed to hang up his leathers.

Upon his retirement from racing, Sands went back to work full-time with his father at Performance Machine. Road racing had expanded his repertoire of skills, and his eye for design was becoming evident. Before

long he was named PM's director of "Research & Development" and headed up their design department. Around that time, though, a pining to do something beyond the constrictions of the manufacturing environment started to creep in. At PM, there was always the shadow of his father's success to deal with, too. Sands began designing some of his own parts that were sold through the Performance Machine catalog. He also started building custom motorcycles. His career got a jump start when he went against Arlen



Ness, the "Godfather of Custom Bike Building," on an episode of the Discovery Channel's Biker Build-Off in 2005, a competition he won. The bike, called "The Hardway," was the first one he fabricated fully from the ground-up and it featured parts he designed, including the wheels, mid-controls, and radial brake calipers. The exposure Sands received couldn't have come at a better time because not long after the episode aired he learned that his dad was selling Performance Machine. This resulted in him investing all his time and energy into his own brand, Roland Sands Design.

Sands has a penchant for utilizing his background as a motorcycle road racer in the custom bikes he designs, often mashing together aspects of sport bikes with cruisers.

"Sometimes I'll do these bikes where we'll take a brand new motorcycle and we'll take a historical idea and smash them together but really put a modern base to it. That's my style," Sands said.

Probably the most notable example of this fusion of styles is the KRV5 Tracker, a board track-style motorcycle he built using a fullblown V-5 MotoGP engine that puts out over 200 horsepower. He got the engine from racing legend Kenny Roberts. By this time Sands' work had begun getting the attention of some of the major manufacturers who wanted to work with him on concept bike projects. Magazine covers and more TV appearances fol-



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lowed. His aftermarket product line was starting to boom as well, particularly parts for Harley-Davidson Dyna and Sportster models. A few years later he added an RSD apparel line to his business portfolio, and like everything else Sands seemed to touch, it was a golden addition to his brand.

While he's had a bustling and fruitful career, one constant in his life is his love for the Sturgis Rally.

"I've been going to Sturgis my entire life, so to be able to be a real part of the show, that's an honor," he said.

"We've had a lot of fun out here, from different rides and experiences and people and concerts and music. I've met a lot of really cool people in Sturgis. I think if you go out there, and go with an open mind and talk to people, you're going to meet some really good people and have experiences you'd think would never happen."

He recounted the story about how one year they came to the Rally and took "a crazy custom" they'd built out for a shakedown around Sturgis. Being brand new, the bike had some bugs so they had to pull over for some roadside repairs. It wasn't long before a handful of riders from the Midwest pulled up on baggers, blue collar guys with raccoon eyes and sunburnt faces. Roland said they stopped because they saw a fellow rider in need and ended up hanging out for quite some time, determined to help get the custom bike going again.

"That's the kind of people and hospitality you run across when you're in Sturgis," Sands said.

When asked about one of his favorite memories from Sturgis, he shared this tale.

"This wasn't too long ago, like maybe five years ago. I was with one of my Swedish buddies and we had just left a concert. We had the Concept 90, which we'd brought out to Sturgis. It was me, Cameron (his right hand man at RSD), one of our other guys and Ola Stenegärd who rode a motorcycle that had, maybe a headlight, no license plate, no tag brackets, no nothing.

"We get out of the concert, and you know how crowded the concerts get out here. So we decided to go right out of the campground instead of left and try to find a back road because I was on my phone and like, I think I found something we could try.

"So we headed about five miles out the other direction down a dirt road and Ola ran out of gas. He couldn't believe it, and there's this huge thunderstorm. It's off in the distance, but we can see it coming, and we're just like, aww man. My buddy's watching the lightning striking and is just blown away. Me and Cameron looked at each other because we're both off-roaders and used to this type of thing, so we're pulling vent lines off the bike. connecting lines together to get fuel in the bike, and we finally get his bike fueled up and decide we're just going to go back the other way.

"On the way back, his bike, he didn't have a taillight on it, and this is like one o'clock in the morning, the witching hour, and he gets pulled over. After reading him the riot act the cop let him go with a warning. It gave my European buddy the full-on Sturgis experience. It was fun to share that madness with him, especially since nothing bad happened," he said with a hearty chuckle.

Undoubtedly, Roland will make sure his bike is fully fueled when he helps lead the Sturgis Mayor's Ride, just one of the many duties of the 2018 Sturgis Grand Marshal. You won't find a much better ambassador than somebody who has true passion for the Rally. For Sands it started as a family affair. He continued to come out and support the rally through his business, Roland Sands Design, and was instrumental

in bringing the popular bar-banging action of hooligan dirt track racing to Sturgis. He's experienced his fair share of Sturgis history first-hand and has a pool of fond memories of the Black Hills that runs deep.

Remembering Tom Monahan...

Remembering Tom Monahan, creator of the well known 'OFFICIAL LOGO' of the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally, involves an incredibly diverse career, spanning four decades. Tom died in December of 2011 but his accomplishments and contributions to the community of Sturgis, it's citizens and to the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally, will live on...

Tom was a very common, yet profoundly generous and diversely talented individual, who devoted a lifetime to helping others through his remarkable talents and accomplishments. He was not only a deeply committed husband and father but an accomplished artist and photographer, creative builder, talented educator, dedicated firefighter, highly successful entrepreneur and dear friend to almost everyone he met.

His community contribution through art began in college when he was commissioned by Black Hills State University to create a metal sculpture for the college campus. A sample of his sculpture work is still displayed on the wall of First Interstate Bank, in Sturgis. In 1972, Tom partnered with Russ Johnson to establish his first business in Sturgis, "Creative Homes". Through this private contracting business, Tom built numerous homes in the Sturgis area. In 1977, he joined the staff at Western Dakota Vo-Tech (Western Dakota Tech, today) as their Building, Design and Construction Instructor, building homes for 10 years throughout the Black Hills/Sturgis area.

During this same time, Tom established TOM'S T'S, a direct silk screen business, located in Sturgis. Soon after, he created and designed the well known "OFFICIAL LOGO", as a means for the Jackpine Gypsies to raise revenue, for the Black Hill Motorcycle Classic Rally. In 1986, Tom gave this "OFFICIAL LOGO" to the Sturgis Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of generating funds for community projects. For almost 30 years, this LOGO has represented the Sturgis® Motorcycle RallyTM.

Through Royalties collected from the sale of products bearing this "OFFICIAL LOGO", it has provided income for Sturgis community projects and improvements. Tom felt strongly that the citizens of Sturgis should benefit from hosting one of the world's largest motorcycle rallies. He continued to champion that cause until his untimely death, in 2011.

Even though the establishment of the "OFFICIAL LOGO" is an outstanding accomplishment in itself, Tom's contribution to the Sturgis community was definitely not limited to the creation and donation of the "Official Logo" for the Sturgis® Motorcycle Rally™. In 1987, Tom formed a partnership with his brother-in- law, Lowell Schwartz and opened "Schwartz/Monahan", a retail, rally business, in Sturgis. That same year, Tom joined the staff at Sturgis High School as an Art Instructor.

Over the next 20 years, he enjoyed sharing his love of art and photography with his students and developed an outstanding Photography Curriculum at that facility. In 1990, he opened "T&M Photography" a professional photographic studio, in Sturgis, with friend and co-teacher, Maury LaRue. Soon after, Tom and friends built the beautiful building on Lazelle Street, to house "T&M Photography" and also constructed the TOM'S T'S Printshop Building, at the same location. Always eager to try new things, Tom remodeled and opened an Art and Magic Store on Main Street Sturgis, in 1997, where he thoroughly enjoyed sharing his interest in Art and Magic Illusions. Tom was constantly looking for new challenges so in 2009, he began remodeling and restoring the TOM'S T'S building on Main Street Sturgis, creating an incredible atmosphere for his final business venture, "Sturgis Wine Co.".

Tom loved people and it showed in every aspect of his life. His many diverse and highly successful business ventures created amazing opportunities for the citizens of Sturgis and greatly contributed to the development, education and creativity of the entire community. His legacy to the Sturgis® Motorcycle Rally™, is it's "OFFICIAL LOGO". Tom's family carries on this legacy through TOM'S T'S, as one of the screen printers of the "OFFICIAL LOGO". For almost 30 years, TOM'S T'S has printed their T-shirts locally, in Sturgis, bearing Tom Monahan's "OFFICIAL LOGO" - The "OFFICIAL LOGO" of the Sturgis® Motorcycle Rally™.

Lonnie James Isam, Jr.

The world of antique motorcycling mourns the loss of one of their most beloved and respected personalities. With his parents by his side, Lonnie Isam, Jr. quietly lost his long and hardfought battle with cancer on August 20, 2017 at his home in Sturgis, South Dakota. Born May 7, 1969 in Edmonds, Washington and raised as the only child of Lonnie Sr. and Marianne Isam, Lonnie grew up surrounded by antique machinery and was well versed in all things motorcycle at an early age. As a teenager he spent weekends scouring garage sales and swap meets with his best friend, then reselling their treasures to make spending money well before eBay, American Pickers or What's in the Barn was ever thought of.

As a young man he traveled to Europe, worked with his father as a motorcycle wrangler on the movie set of Oliver Stone's conspiracy film, JFK, and immersed himself



in learning all he could about motorcycling's past. Respected as a leading authority on motorcycle history and restoration, Lonnie

eventually opened his own motorcycle shop called Jurassic Racing in Sturgis, South Dakota, but it is the Motorcvcle Cannonball Run that he will always be remembered for.

Known around the globe as the founder of the most difficult antique motorcycle endurance ride in the world. Lonnie

started the famous Cannonball Run back in 2010, forever

changing the landscape of antique motorcycling by encouraging owners to make their ancient machines roadworthy and hit



the blacktop with fellow enthusiasts. His original quest to just share a ride along America's back roads with friends catapulted the wrenching visionary into the public eve as he managed to lead a different international group of adventurous

riders in an epic excursion across the country three more times after the inaugural run. Participants have declared the runs as "life changing." And while Lonnie Jr. was always happiest when sharing a lane with his friends, his role of promoter launched the quiet gear head into a spotlight he was ill prepared for. He eschewed the limelight and shunned publicity. As far as he was concerned, the old bikes deserved to live out their lives as they were intended, being ridden, and that was all that was important. Lonnie Isam Jr. will forever be a part of motorcycling's glorious history.

His birth mother, Joanne Marie Isam, preceded Lonnie Jr. in death. As per his request, there were no services. Instead, it is suggested you take a ride through the country and recall a man who lived his life for his many friends and the sincere love of antique motorcycles.

The newly-formed Jackpine Gypsies Motorcycle Club holds its first weekend races sanctioned by the AMA. Nine racers competed for \$750 in prize money while about 200 spectators cheered them on. The weekend also included a number of challenge meets to entertain the crowd between the official races.

A group of local businessmen added events to the weekend to include a banquet, parade and free shows each evening, while the Gypsy Tour saw 55 riders taking a day-ride in the Black Hills.

After taking a hiatus because riders and motorcycles alike were needed for the nation's war effort, the "Motorcycle Classic" returns. Despite the fact that advertising was limited to the local area, the Jackpine Gypsies managed to draw about 4,000 spectators to the two-day event.

1951-1955

The Rally gained national exposure when it was chosen as the site of the AMA Five-Mile National Championship Race in 1952, 1953, and 1954 and the Six-Mile National Championship in 1955. During this same period, local support also grew. Local organizations, service clubs and churches started to set up vendor spaces on Main Street with food, souvenirs and raffles. The event expanded to a four-day event during this time with two days of touring and two days of racing.

Rally organizers used Main Street for the first time - a tradition that has grown in the ensuing years. In 1949, Main Street was used for two hours worth of events on Friday evening - with prizes for oldest, youngest and best dressed riders sponsored by local merchants.

Racing which had been such an important part of the initial Rally begins to lose some of its importance as the Rally continues to grow in numbers.

1982

Continued issues at City Park prompt local officials to close the park to camping, providing an opportunity for new private owners to open campgrounds outside the city limits. At the same time. local residents defeated a referendum that would have prohibited the City from offering financial support to the Rally.

1988

The Jackpine Gypsies again host a national race – this time. a 600cc National Short Track – part of a new lineup of national races put together by the AMA.

Clarence "Pappy" Hoel who had been an integral part of the Rally since its inception died in February of 1989.







In fact, a real Formula One racecar sits on top of the custom glass elevator, which itself is flanked by four motorcycle towers! You'll see motorcycles and other art attached to the walls and some even hanging from the ceiling.

With a collection of more than 1,600 motorcycles—over 900 of which are on exhibit—as well as 55 vintage Lotus cars and a sanctioned road course, the Barber Museum is truly a motorsports paradise. With a mission and staff dedicated to the preservation, interpretation, exhibition, and history of motorcycles, vintage vehicles, and motorsports, everything is kept at its finest.

At this living museum are some of the oldest motorcycles in the world. There's an example of an 1894 Hildebrand &

Wolfmüller and a 1902 Steffey, both of which are actually capable of running. Some of the rarest Harley-Davidsons, Indians, and Hondas are on exhibit with some of the most innovative makes and models, including one of only 10 Britten V1000s in existence.

There are many opportunities to enrich your Barber Museum experience, obtain benefits, and show support. One way is to join the museum's membership program. Active Turn 9 Club members gain free admission to the museum, quarterly issues of Vintage Insider News, store discounts, and an annual Barber Vintage Festival poster. 



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Harley-Davidson Museum



On June 1, 2006, Harley-Davidson began building an attraction that would forever alter Milwaukee's landscape. The facility opened its doors on July 12, 2008. The Harley-Davidson Museum is literally a "walkthrough history" that is portrayed through its themed galleries, a must-see motorcycle collection, and many rare documents and original artifacts you will only find here.

Some of the highlights in the collection include:

- The oldest Harley-Davidson in existence Serial No. 1
- A replica board track complete with race bikes banking on a corner
- A movie sampling of Hollywood's best motorcycle moments
- The inspiring stories of personal freedom that only a Harley-Davidson can bring to people

The facility is also the location of the Harley-Davidson Archives, home to the original historical collections dating to the earliest days of the Motor Company.

National Motorcycle Museum



The mission of National Motorcycle Museum, Anamosa, Iowa, is to preserve and present the great history of American motorcycling. Museum exhibits represent machines made everywhere in the world; machines we have ridden here in America for over 120 years. Merkel, Thor, Excelsior, Curtiss, Reading-Standard are among early American brands on display in the Museum, but Harley-Davidson and Indian motorcycles are best represented. European makers like Ducati, Moto-Guzzi, Parilla, BMW are here, plus British marques such as Velocette, Brough, Vincent, Douglas and of course Triumph, BSA and Norton.

Many of us got our start on smaller Japanese machines from the 1960's but even earlier as well as much newer Japanese bikes on display may remind you of your beginnings.

The National Motorcycle Museum's goal is to present a wide range of motorcycle history and passion through fine interpretive exhibits built around a fine collection of machines and historical objects from around the world. Changing exhibition topics have included the custom bikes by Arlen Ness, drag racing, land speed record, police and military, and motocross/enduro plus hillclimb, board track and dirt track racing. Most special exhibits are in place one year and often include machines and memorabilia loaned to the Museum for a period of time. In fact, since the Museum opened in Anamosa in 2001, most of the motorcycles in the National Motorcycle Museum have been loaned by supportive collectors.

While the National Motorcycle Museum has, at last count, 498 motorcycles on display, what is really exceptional about this museum is its memorabilia. Literally thousands of printed documents like advertising posters, manuals, post cards, photos and even original paintings are on display plus riding gear and race trophies. The 600 piece toy collection includes tin and cast iron and some great

and rare pedal cars. Over 60 19th and early 20th Century

bicycles and early advertising art are on display as well. Membership is a popular way to become more involved with the Museum and annual and life memberships are offered. The Museum is also supported by a dedicated group of volunteers who work in Anamosa but also help out at about 20 events the Museum attends each year; swap meets, consumer shows and bike shows from Nebraska to Pennsylvania.

When you plan a visit know that the Museum is set in the beautiful bluffs of the Mississippi River and fine winding roads offering great scenery abound and J&P Cycles is just up the road one mile. Eastern Iowa's small towns have great character and welcome motorcyclists into their establishments. Most shopkeepers in the region know of the National Motorcycle Museum and J&P Cycles, founded by the late John Parham. In fact, the National Motorcycle Museum was voted the Iowa Tourism Outstanding Attraction for 2015. Located just outside the inviting downtown Anamosa, it's an easy walk from the Museum to a diner and two fast-food restaurants and other retail.

The National Motorcycle Museum is open every day, year around, closed only on New Years Day, Easter Sunday, Thanksgiving and Christmas day. Seasonal daily hours are on the Museum website as is a short video tour to give you a taste of Museum exhibitions. Go to www. nationalmcmuseum.org to plan your trip.

Legends Vintage Motorcycle Museum



Situated in the heart of Springville, Utah with majestic Maple Mountain as its extraordinary backdrop, is the spectacular, unprecedented Legends Motorcycle Museum. If it were to boast a billboard it might read, "I dreamed a dream"...but who would have dreamed a young teenager and his love of bikes would evolve into a private collection of vintage motorcycles that would rival Harley-Davidson

themselves? Built literally, brick by brick by builder and avid motorcycle enthusiast Rick Salisbury.

Salisbury's personal love of collecting has amassed over 200 vintage motorcycles, mounds of one-of-a-kind memorabilia, a rare trophy collection, and original art by world renowned motorcycle-centric artists such as David Uhl, Scott Jacobs, Tom Fritz, and Bronze sculptor Jeff Decker.

Legends' upper viewing gallery houses Salisbury's crown jewel, a completely unrestored 1907 Harley-Davidson Strap Tank. One of only three Strap Tanks in existence, Salisbury's is the only bike that survived with its original paint, engine, frame and tires.

The 1907 Strap Tank is flanked on the right with a 1905 Single (World's Oldest Harley-Davidson) and to the left a rare1909 Single-Police (that served in the La Crosse, Wisconsin Police Department).

Salisbury's collection includes other rarities such as; the oldest unrestored Indian motorcycle-a 1903 Camel Back, his 1916 Excelsior, which Salisbury rode cross-country in the 2016 Cannonball, and a truly incomparable bike, a Feilbach "Limited" the last bike off production, that was built using left-over parts which remained after the bankrupted Feilbach Motor Co. shuttered its manufacturing factory in 1914.

The unique architecture and design of the sprawling 20,000 sq. ft. Museum is itself a work of art, thanks to Salisbury's meticulous attention to detail and Artist's vision. "I didn't want the building to have a warehouse feel, I wanted the building to be a feature along with the bikes to tie it all in and give an entire experience", says Salisbury. To ensure a unique visitor experience, he later added the adjoining Side Car Café, which serves all American fare and all-day breakfast from a locally sourced fresh menu.

Across the Legends' compound you can also enjoy an amazing meal or a home brewed brew at his Strap Tank Brewery, established in 2016. Strap Tank Brewery is another one-of-a-kind...the first brewpub in Utah County since prohibition. Yet another architectural work of art, Salisbury designed the building, replicating unique architectural elements such as the towering smoke stack from the original Harley-Davidson building in Wisconsin.

If you're lucky enough on your tour, when they aren't out pickin', you'll find Salisbury himself, wife Vickie and their Rottweiler Frank who are daily patrons.

The "Tintic Motorcycle Museum" will be opening in the summer of 2018 in the Historic Mining Town of Eureka, Utah.

This Unique 5000 Square foot Museum is located right in the middle of town on Historic Main Street (Hwy 6) in the Old Post Office. The United States Post Office operated from this building from 1922-1996.

The Museum hosts vintage and antique motorcycles of all makes as well as a Coffee Shop and Art Gallery (with free Wi-Fi).

Eureka, Utah is located on Scenic Utah State Highway 6 at an elevation of 6500 feet and is center of the "Tintic Mining District". The District was the Number One silver producer in the United States from 1869 thru 1917 and continued to be a top producer until 1950 (it produced over 300 million dollars of silver, about 4 billion in today's dollars. In 1979 Eureka was placed in the National **Register of Historic** Places to help protect

this little town take some time to look around. In addition to enjoying the Tintic Motorcycle Museum, walk down Main Street and view the old historic buildings that line both sides of the street. Eureka and the surrounding mountains also offer a wide range of other activities such as hiking,riding off highway vehicles, rock hounding, camping, shooting or just relaxing with your family.



The Evel Knievel Museum allows visitors to enjoy the singular showcase of genuine artifacts belonging to the most legendary, death-defying daredevil of all time. It's a world-class facility containing the most complete Evel Knievel collection in the world including actual leathers, helmets, and hidden-cache canes, X-rays showing the metal pins that held Evel together, and rare, never-before-seen jump video and photos.

But that's just the start. Put on the virtual reality goggles and headset to pilot a jump bike perched on Evel's actual ramp for an immersive jump experience, complete with rushing wind and rumbling impact. Giant touch screens reveal Knievel's broken bones, connecting injuries to the jumps that caused them with video of the actual events. The "Plan A Jump" wall allows four players to choose bike, wardrobe and obstacles, plus speed, ramp angle, distance and other variables before launching, offering STEM educational opportunities. But crash or succeed, no visitors are damaged in the playing of this game!

On display are Evel's own jump bikes—motorcycles that sometimes launched him toward horrific crashes. These include bikes Knievel piloted at Wembley Stadium and Caesar's Palace featuring their original sheetmetal, painted by Evel's artist George Sedlak. See the X-2 Sky Cycle launched at Snake River, perched on Evel's ramp and installed over dirt brought in from the original location. A centerpiece of the collection is the most iconic Bell helmet in the world: the 1966 Bell Star worn by Evel Knievel for the Caesar's Palace jump—and subsequent crash. Visitors can also view clips of Evel's Hollywood stints in a 1970's-era movie theatre complete with marquee and costumes.

One of America's premiere iconic brands, Harley-Davidson manufactured its first motorcycle in 1903. Founded in a shed by the Harley brothers and Walter Davidson, they incorporated in 1907, settled in Milwaukee and an American legend was born.

The turn of the century saw a new industry born as many small motorcycle manufacturers sprang up across America. Harley-Davidson grew through the next decade, and during World War I supplied motorcycles for the United States' war effort. By the early 1930s, the only surviving American motorcycle companies were Harley-Davidson and Indian®.

World War II again saw Harley-Davidson contributing to the war effort, producing

90,000 units for the American military. Post-war Harley-Davidson continued to grow, introducing the iconic Sportster in 1957, the oldest continuous production model in its current lineup, and bringing the Softail[™], FLT, and Road King[™] models into the family in the '80s and '90s. Harley-Davidson continues to innovate, introducing V-Rod, the first liquid-cooled production Harley in 2002 and today with a complete redesign of the Softail chassis, a new generation has been born.

After a successful career as a Harley racing legend and Hollywood stuntman, Buddy Stubbs opened the first Harley-Davidson dealership in Phoenix in 1966. The dealership became the home of his extensive collection of vintage motorcycles and the Historic Motorcycle Museum was born.

The collection spans the history of Harley-Davidson, and also features rare models from AJS, BMW, BSA, Triumph, Zundapp, Indian and more.



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

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

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Twin Treasures in the Black hills

While Sturgis and Deadwood remain the central hubs during the Black Hills Classic, additional towns in the area provide a laidback alternative to the madness of Main Street and Lazelle. Two of those are Hill City and Custer.

While thousands of riders utilize US-385 South that originates between Deadwood and Lead to access Mount Rushmore, Iron Mountain Road and the Needles Highway, you are doing yourself a disservice by not stopping in Hill City along the way. Also known as "The Heart of the Hills," when coming into town on US-385/16 (Main Street) during the Rally, through traffic is directed to take a left onto Railroad Street—big mistake. Stay on Main and take the time to find a parking spot as the town celebrates the Rally with a wide variety of motorcyclerelated vendors. But along with the biker gear, be sure not to overlook Hill City's year-round local businesses.

Some that highlight the nature of this rustic community are Wade's Gold Mill where you can learn the history of gold mining in the Black Hills and even take gold-panning lessons. Or tease your senses with a wine tasting at Naked Winery, the Prairie Berry Winery or Twisted Pine Winery before enjoying a two-hour 20 mile round trip aboard the 1880 Train Ride between Hill City and Keystone that slices through the beautiful Black Hills. And if you're feeling bold—and have some extra space on the bike—stop in for a visit at The Farmer's Daughter on Main Street. With a rotating stock of collectibles, antiques and home décor gifts, you're sure to find something to fill up those saddlebags.

Just 20 miles further south on US-385, you will enter the quaint town of Custer, the gateway to Custer State Park. Generally considered to the oldest town established by European Americans in the Black Hills, the town lays claim to having the widest Main Street in the United



States, originally designed so that a team of oxen pulling a wagon could completely turn around. And that wide Main Street comes in handy during the Rally when the center esplanade is reserved strictly for motorcycles. As in Hill City, various bike-related vendors dot Main during the Rally. While you will not find the big rigs of major manufacturers, since the vendor space is more economical the cost savings is passed on to attendees. One of our favorite places to grab a drink and some grub is The Custer Wolf on Mt. Rushmore Road (Main Street) with their Buffalo Burger and Moose Drool Beer.

And while on US-385, either when heading south to Hill City and Custer or riding back north to Sturgis, be sure to stop at Pactola Reservoir to stretch your legs and take a few photos—a beautiful backdrop.

So during your visit to the Sturgis Rally, be certain to get out of town and do some exploring. You never know what you might discover.





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

Sturgis ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Sturgis Economic Development Corp (SEDC) is the area's business relocation expert. As the economic development organization serving the City of Sturgis, Meade County and the State of South Dakota, SEDC is the regional "go to" source for assistance with business relocation, expansion and start-up needs.

SEDC administers three revolving loan funds and partners with local, state and national lenders to design competitive financing and incentive packages to assist businesses. Creative options for sale, lease and build-to-suit can be tailored to meet specific needs of businesses and are based on job creation and economic impact. Relocation assistance, workforce grants and property tax forgiveness are samples of the attractive incentives that could be available to qualifying businesses.

As the Meade County seat, Sturgis enjoys a healthy business mix. Prospective employers are drawn to the region's stable workforce in this "rightto-work" state. Since 2014, 37 businesses employing nearly 400 have expanded or opened in Sturgis, many with the assistance of SEDC, Meade County's property tax abatement, and incentives designed to meet specific needs of qualifying businesses.

SEDC developed the 45-acre Sturgis Industrial Park. Located off I-90 at Exit 30, it offers certified site-ready parcels for development. It has a UPS distribution facility on site, and is home to metalrelated manufacturing for the firearms, agricultural and motorcycle industries. **Businesses in the Sturgis** Industrial Park benefit from efficient regional and global distribution, as well as cost-effective operations.

The Park also houses the Meade School District's machine tool technology program, pairing on-site classwork with internship opportunities. This handson training provides manufacturers a direct talent source for qualified employees. Since 2013, SEDC has been involved in six residential housing developments offering 278 units which accommodate a variety of ages, lifestyles and incomes. Two new state-licensed child care facilities recently opened, with the capacity to serve over 270 children and families in the expanding Sturgis community.

To keep up with the growing population base, Regional Healthcare completed a \$10+ million expansion to the Sturgis Regional Hospital and Clinic in 2018. The Meade School District is constructing a new \$16.5 million middle school that will open in Fall 2018.

Visit a Historic Post Fort Meade was established during the winter of 1878-79 by units of the 1st and 11th Infantry and the reorganized 7th Cavalry. The mission of the 10 company post was to

provide military protection for the gold seekers and settlers of the Northern Black Hills. General Phil Sheridan, famed Civil

War Cavalry, reportedly selected the picturesque

site for the new post. The site is located about two miles southwest of nearby Bear Butte. It was on the parade grounds that the "Star Spangled Banner" was first played in an official capacity for evening retreat. Long before it became the National Anthem, those present at its playing snapped to attention. On a lonely journey, the wounded Cavalry horse, Comanche, found his way back home to Sturgis from Montana. It was at Fort Meade that Comanche – the only military

survivor of the Battle of Little Big Horn - was officially retired with military honors. It was also at Fort Meade that the controversial Major Marcus A. Reno was cashiered from service by court martial for

scandalous behavior. Many celebrated frontier Army units saw service at Fort Meade, including the 4th Cavalry which was headquartered there for over 20 years. It outlived all other frontier posts of the Upper Missouri West surviving


as a military installation until 1944 when it became a Veterans Administration Hospital. It still operates as such today, serving the mental and physical health of those who served America. The campus also encompasses the scenic Fort Meade Recreation Area. Covering 6,693 acres, it is a mix of prairie and forest with miles of picturesque trails for hikers, mountain bikers and horses. A scenic Back Country byway runs through it. The area is also full of historic markers commemorating

the area's significance including the Fort Meade Post Cemetery. Many remnants of the historic peace-keeping old post have been faithfully preserved. Numerous mementos of the colorful units and troopers who served here are on display at the Fort Meade Museum. The military buildings and residences have been retained under a Historical Preservation Designation and are maintained by the Veterans Administration that now occupies the post.

You'll also want to check out the Fort Meade Museum. It's a non-profit association dedicated to preserving the history of the Fort Meade military post and units that served there from 1877 to 1944. The Museum is open daily from mid-May through September with hours of operation from 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.



Fort Meade Recreation — Area —

The Fort Meade Recreation Area is composed of approximately 6,700 acres of forest and grasslands, The area is managed to protect, preserve, and enhance its cultural, historic, recreational, and wildlife values. Many trails offer both scenic views of Bear Butte and the prairie, as well as the Black Hills to the South.



Fort Meade National Back Country Byway

The 5-mile gravel road from Exit 34 off of I-90 to Fort Meade is designated as the National Back Country Byway. While on this road you will find many noteworthy sites such as: the Veterans of Foreign Wars Memorial Chapel, Curley Grimes' Grave, the Sidney to Deadwood Stagecoach and Wagon Freight Trail, and Cavalry Jumps. The Fort Meade Post Cemetery is the only intact cavalry cemetery in the western United States. 119 of the 200 burials in this cemetery took place prior to 1900. The first burial was recorded in

1878 and the last in 1943. The road is also home to the site of Camp Fechner which was the site of a Civilian Conservation Camp. Established in the 1930s, it was the district headquarters for the 16 CCC camps in the Black Hills. Additionally, Camp Fechner was used to house German prisoners-of-war in 1945. Today, only a few foundations remain to mark the site of the headquarters camp. The temporary wooden buildings were torn down when the program was abandoned. The byway ends at Highway 34 and the entrance to Fort Meade.

FORT MEADE TRAIL

During the Summer of 2017, The City of Sturgis partnered with the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish & Parks agency as well as the Federal Highway Administration to build a new recreational trail on the south side of the historical Ft. Meade campus. This beautiful new trail winds through towering Ponderosa pines, peaceful meadows and areas of historical significance. Trail users will enjoy many beautiful views of Bear Butte and the Black Hills. The trail also serves as an important connector to the Sturgis and the Centennial Trail systems.

Camping is allowed at both the Alkali Creek Trailhead and Alkali Creek Horse camp. The camp is open year-round with a fee required May 15th through September 30th. Electric and sewer hookups are not available. Twenty-two picnic areas are available at the Alkali Creek Trailhead. Restrooms and water are available. A one-half mile self-guided trail runs behind the Alkali Creek trailhead.

The Centennial Trail is the perfect way to experience the Black Hills. Known as Trail No. 89, it is a lasting legacy of South Dakota's 1989 centennial year of statehood. Its 111**mile** length explores the diversity of South Dakota. This is the longest trail in the Black Hills, with more than two dozen access points at intervals of 3 to 10 miles. You will experience old growth forests, sunny meadows dotted with wildflowers, towering granite crags and remote canyons. It begins at Bear Butte and ends at Wind Cave National Park.

A one-mile trail

has been added to connect the Fort Meade Recreation Area and the 111 mile Centennial Trail to Sturgis' core. Coined as the Main Street to the Trails, the path can be accessed via the far East end of Main Street at Lion's Club Park. Sturgis has over 10 miles of bike path within the city limits. The most popular trailheads are located at the Sturgis Municipal Park on the east end of Lazelle Street, Centennial Park located behind McDonald's on the west end of Lazelle Street, and the City Fairgrounds located on Ballpark Road. Dogs are allowed on the path but must be kept on a leash at all times.

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The Black Hills National Forest and the area surrounding Sturgis is riddled with scenic trails for a variety of skill levels. The terrains vary from heavily wooded forest to groves of oak and aspen. There are grassy meadows ideal for a family picnic and scenic outlooks perfect for pictures.



Off-Roading


With access points to many of the Black Hills National Forest motor-vehicle use trails just minutes from Sturgis, you can take your ATV/UTV and explore the Hills. The Black Hills National Forest regional offices have official forest service maps and motor vehicle use maps available. The maps provide information for all Black Hills National Forest area trails which can be used for various offroad vehicles. You can pick up the map while you're purchasing your use permit which is required for all off-road vehicles.



*Explore*Bear Butte STATE PARK


Formed millions of years ago when molten lava pushed upward into the overlying sedimentary rock, this igneous rock formation is a sacred site to several tribes throughout North America and portions of Canada. It is known as "Mata Paha" or Bear Mountain to the Lakota People. The Cheyenne call it "Noahvose." Known for its holiness and mystery, Bear Butte has acted as a place of prayer and reflection for more than 4,000 years. Even today, traditional Native ceremonies are held there throughout the year. If you choose to hike the site, please be respectful of its significance. You'll see prayer cloths and ties. They vary by tribe and band, but all are sacred and should not be photographed or touched. With its small herd of bison and incredible vistas, Bear Butte is an incredible place to experience nature and show respect for the Native tribes who have worshiped there for

centuries.



Golf

If you're a fan of golf, take time to play 18 holes at the Boulder Canyon Country Club. Open to the public, this course sits just a few miles west of downtown Sturgis. Situated at the edge of the Black Hills National Forest this course offers challenges and world-class views. Or visit Elkhorn Ridge Golf Club in Spearfish off I-90 at Exit 17 offering an 18-hole course with hidden canyons, elevated tees and broad sloping greens.





Fishing

Fishing is a year-round sport in South Dakota and the Black Hills. Bear Butte Lake, Fort Meade Reservoir, Lions Club Pond and Dalton Lake are all located within just minutes of Sturgis. If you prefer fly fishing, there are beautiful streams not far from Sturgis that our elusive trout thrive in. Ice fishing is a fantastic winter sport. Popular ice fishing locations near Sturgis include Pactola Reservoir, French Creek, Spearfish Creek, Spring Creek, and Bear Butte Lake. The amazing scenery, abundant wildlife and fantastic fishing have fisherman flocking to western South Dakota during the winter months.

Camping

From traditional camping in the forest to cozy cabins at the local campgrounds, we offer it all. Many areas of the Black Hills National Forest can be used for overnight camping (check with the Forest Service for specific areas). At Bear Butte Lake and Dalton Lake, visitors can camp for a minimal fee. Both have specified camp sites and limited facilities. The Fort Meade Recreation Area also offers campsites with easy access to trails and space for horses. There are also many State and National campgrounds available throughout the Black Hills. For those with a more plush idea of "roughing it," Sturgis has many private campgrounds offering a variety of amenities. See the Camping/Cabins/RV list in the directory of this magazine to find the one that's right for you.

Cross-Country Skiing & Snowshoeing

If cross-country skiing or snowshoeing is your passion, you'll find no better place than within the Black Hills National Forest and on the many trails surrounding Sturgis. With an average snow accumulation in the Black Hills of around 150 inches annually, conditions are generally favorable between late November and early March. Prime destinations include the Centennial Trail and the Fort Meade Recreation Area. Both offer incredible scenery and storied Western pasts. Additionally, there are nearly 60 miles of marked and mapped trails in the Black Hills National Forest. They are easy enough for beginners and beautiful enough for the more experienced to enjoy. If you don't have your own snowshoes, you can borrow them from the South Dakota State Parks. Visit their website for details.





Snowmobiling

The Black Hills Area is a snowmobiler's dream destination. With over 350 miles of marked trails that are available to you December 1 through March 31 you are bound to find sights you will not encounter anywhere else. These marked trails wind through pine forests and open meadows and climb up to 6,000 feet in elevation, providing spectacular summit lookouts. This trail system has been ranked in the top 10 places to ride in the nation. With 1.3 million acres of National Forest lands to explore, it is unlikely you will encounter much traffic. There are several spots on the trail system to stop and enjoy nature or grab a bite to eat and relax. Snowmobile rentals are available in the Sturgis area and average about \$150 per day. Many retailers offer half-day, single-day, weekend, and full week packages.



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
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
